Critical Incident Response (CIR) Training

FSEAP (Family Services Employee Assistance Programs) has long provided Critical Incident Response for workplaces across Canada. Under the guidance of Family Service Canada, we are pleased to announce a new CIR training program for Family Service agencies. This live 2-part webinar series builds on best practices literature and provides a comprehensive overview of how to deliver critical incident response services that promote psychological safety, wellbeing, and resilience among employees and teams after experiencing a traumatic incident in the workplace.

This training covers the nature and frequency of critical incidents in the workplace, how to incorporate Psychological First Aid (PFA) and the A.C.T. Model principles into practice with individuals and workgroups, and how to organize response to incidents in the workplace. Additional focus will be placed on exercising cultural competency in the workplace setting, responding to mass disasters, and how to promote resiliency and self-care.

Women's Financial Empowerment Program at Family Services Ottawa

We have partnered with financial literary advocates and community workers who are supporting women experiencing gender-based violence. Together we have created educational resources covering a variety of financial topics, including:

- Protecting your Finances in a Relationship
- Building a Financial Exit Strategy, and
- Financial Literacy Resource Guide for Service Providers



Our resources are available for anyone to use and distribute. We have them available in 7 languages: English, French, Arabic, Mandarin, Cantonese, Somali, and Farsi.
