Natasha joined Family Service PEI (FSPEI) as the Executive Director in April 2022. She is based in Epektwik (Prince Edward Island) located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq People.

Prior to joining FSPEI, she was a manager of Education and Community Development at CMHA PEI. In previous roles, she worked with community organizations and First Nations across Canada in the design, delivery, and evaluation of programs to improve the financial security and well-being of people living on a low income.

Natasha has a BA in History from UPEI and a Masters in Adult Education and Community Development from OISE/University of Toronto where she focused on Workplace Learning and Social Change. She is a board member with the Community Sector Network of PEI.

One of her go-to activities/coping tools is going for a run or a walk in the woods. She has completed two marathons to date in Chicago (2017) and Berlin (2018) and is thinking about training for her third in 2023. Location TBD!

As a new ED, she felt an incredible amount of relief (and joy!) on her first call with her Family Service Atlantic colleagues. In a role that can feel overwhelming at times, to have this connection to incredible leaders who have been there (or
